

NATIONAL FRATERNAL CONGRESS OF AMERICA

More than 500 delegates, representing fraternal benefit life insurance societies in the United States and Canada, attended the 79th annual convention of the National Fraternal Congress of America in Washington, D.C., September 26-29.

The delegates from our Order who participated were Ralph C. Dare, M. E. Recorder, John F. Stay, Membership Director and Clarence L. Alford, our Actuary.

Presiding over the convention as president

Presiding over the convention as president was Mr. Frank H. Lee, General Counsel, Woman's Benefit Association, Port Huron, Mich. At the convention's close, officers for the ensuing year were elected and installed. Miss Louise Patrick, administrative vice president for the Woodmen of the World Life Insurance Society, Omaha, Nebr., assumed the presidency. Elected vice president was Harold J. Lamboley, New Haven, Conn., Supreme Advocate of the Knights of Columbus. Foster F. Farrell, Chicago, Ill., was re-elected

secretary-treasurer.

The National Fraternal Congress of America was organized in 1886 in Washington, D.C., by representatives of 16 fraternal benefit societies. Today it represents 98 societies having nearly 10 million members in 63,914

local lodges.

Major purposes of the congress include the promotion of the general welfare of the fraternal benefit system in all matters of mutual concern and public interest. It was also established to disseminate information to the general public regarding the fraternal benefit system, to render service to member societies in general and to lend assistance to all fraternal benefit societies.

At the annual conventions, problems pe-culiar to procedures and the system in general are discussed and solutions sought. To this forum, the various officers of the societies bring their ideas for the betterment of the individual society and the system as a whole. A free interchange of ideas and methods is conducted. The meetings are held not only to benefit each society and the system, but also to give careful attention to public interest and general acceptance.

At the beginning of 1965, societies affiliated with the NFCA had nearly 15 billion dollars of fraternal insurance in force, owned by the members. Assets of the societies totaled \$3,685,464,223 and the benefits paid in 1964 alone totaled \$246,017,640. All together, these societies have paid more than nine and one-half billion dollars in benefits

to their members.
